

IMPACT STORY

Ganesh Prasad Burnwal, a 56-year-old farmer from Jhajha, Jamui District, had been suffering from Lymphatic Filariasis (LF) for six years. Due to a lack of awareness and treatment, his condition worsened to Grade II, causing severe swelling, discomfort, and psychological distress. His family's attempts at homeopathic treatment proved ineffective, further deepening their frustration. Referred to the NTD Clinic through a Rapid Inquiry Survey by LEPROA Society, Ganesh received intervention under the ASPIRE Project. Physiotherapy technicians trained him in morbidity management and provided a self-care kit and protective footwear during an Self Support Group Meeting. Committed to the self-care regimen, Ganesh experienced significant improvement within three months, reducing his condition from Grade II to Grade I. This not only restored his physical health but also boosted his confidence and well-being. Empowered by his recovery, Mr. Ganesh now actively raises awareness about LF in his village, encouraging others to seek timely intervention. His journey highlights the transformative impact of awareness, education, and community support in managing LF, demonstrating how initiatives like the ASPIRE Project can change lives and combat stigma.

Meet Our Staff



GANJI VENKATESHWARLU BPHRC

How did you join LEPRA, and what is the work you do? - I joined LEPRA Society in January 2000 as an Attender and received training in ulcer care at the Central Leprosy Institute, Chengalpattu. I now provide ulcer care, POP support, self-care training for leprosy and LF patients, and conduct Podocan assessments and footwear distribution for diabetic patients.

How do you engage with local communities to raise awareness? - I participate in community-based camps, awareness sessions, and house-to-house visits, educating people about leprosy, lymphatic filariasis, and diabetes care. Through interactive discussions and live demonstrations, I encourage self-care practices and help reduce stigma.

What are the most significant challenges, and how would you address them in your role?

The biggest challenge is ensuring continuous care and adherence to treatment among patients. Many people hesitate due to stigma and lack of awareness. I address this by providing consistent follow-ups, counseling, and demonstrating self-care techniques to empower patients.

A memory at LEPRA that you would like to share?

One of my most cherished memories is a house-to-house survey where our team engaged directly with communities, conducting camps and offering much-needed support. I also recall a person who had suffered from leprosy for decades. When he came to BPHRC, I provided him with limb care, and over time, he recovered. Overwhelmed with joy, he wept and hugged me—a moment I will never forget.
